Re: Notice of Summary Suspension: EMT-Basic Certification # 567621 Investigation Control # 2012-153

Dear Mr. Eden:

The New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services (the Department) is vested with the responsibility of carrying out the provisions of *N.J.S.A.* 26:2H-1 *et seq.*, the *Health Care Facilities Planning Act*, which was enacted, in part, to ensure that all hospital and related health care services rendered in the State of New Jersey are of the highest quality. As defined at *N.J.S.A.* 26:2H-2b, health care services include any prehospital care rendered by basic life support (BLS) personnel. In addition, *N.J.S.A.* 26:2K-7 *et seq.*, the *Emergency Medical Services Act*, authorizes the Department to certify Emergency Medical Technician-Basics (EMT-Basic). In furtherance of the objectives set forth in the statutes, the Department has adopted regulations that govern the training, certification and professional conduct of EMT-Basic and EMT-Basic candidates. (*See: N.J.A.C.* 8:40A-1.1, *Emergency Medical Technicians-Basics: Training and Certification.*)

On April 12, 2012, the Department's Office of Emergency Medical Services (OEMS) was notified by the Gloucester Township Police Department (GTPD) that you were arrested for the obtaining controlled dangerous substances (CDS) while on duty as a police officer for GTPD. As a matter of policy, the OEMS opened an investigation in response to the information received.

Further investigation revealed that on April 3, 2012, you were arrested under complaint number W-2012-000720-0415. The complaint alleges that while on duty as a police officer and in full uniform, including your service weapon, you obtained numerous and different controlled dangerous substances (CDS) in violation of *N.J.S.A.* 2C:35-10A(1), 2C:35-11A(1), 2C:39-4.1A, and 2C:35-5B(5).

As you know, EMT-Basics work in unsupervised two-person teams to respond effectively to emergencies. You should also know that neither member of the team works in a supervisory capacity. Rather, one team member drives the vehicle, and the other is alone in back of the ambulance providing emergency medical care. As such, the nature of this work requires that these individuals make important medical assessments and carry out appropriate pre-hospital interventions at motor vehicle accidents, in people's homes and at other difficult field locations. In order to be effective, EMT-Basics must unconditionally trust each other and be incontestably trusted by EMT-Paramedics, police officers, fire fighters, doctors and other professionals.

*N.J.A.C.* 8:40A-10.2(a) states: "The Commissioner, or his/her designee, may summarily suspend a person's EMT-Basic and/or EMT-Instructor certification when, in his/her opinion, the continued certification of that person poses an immediate or serious threat to the public health, safety or welfare."

Because of the seriousness of the crimes with which you have been charged, the Department finds that your continued certification as an EMT-Basic constitutes an immediate and serious threat to the health, safety, and welfare of the public. **Therefore, your certification as an EMT-Basic is immediately suspended and shall remain suspended indefinitely.** 

Therefore, you may not, under any circumstances, act in the capacity of, or perform the duties of an EMT-Basic in New Jersey during this period of suspension. Be aware, if you act in the capacity of, or perform the duties of, an EMT-Basic in New Jersey during this period of suspension, your actions will constitute impersonation of an EMT-Basic in violation of *N.J.A.C.* 8:40A-10.4 and shall incur further penalties.

In accordance with *N.J.A.C.* 8:40A-7.1(f), certification cards are the property of the Department and shall be immediately surrendered upon demand. You are hereby directed to immediately surrender your EMT-Basic certification card(s) to the OEMS, either by U.S. mail to the address on the first page of this Notice, or by physical delivery to the Department of Health and Senior Services, OEMS, John Fitch Way, Market and Warren Streets, Trenton, NJ 08611.

In the interim, the OEMS will continue to investigate this matter. You will be notified when the OEMS has completed its investigation, at which time you will be advised what action(s), if any, will be taken with respect to your EMT-Basic certification.

Pursuant to *N.J.A.C.* 8:40A-10.3(a), you may appeal to the Commissioner of the Department of Health and Senior Services for a hearing before the Office of Administrative Law to contest this summary suspension. If the summary suspension is upheld at the Office of New Jersey Administrative Law, you may apply for injunctive relief in New Jersey Superior Court. Your request for an administrative hearing regarding this matter must be submitted in writing and must be accompanied by a response to the charges contained herein. Finally, please note that failure to submit a request for a hearing within 30 days from the date of this Notice shall be interpreted as an acceptance of this Department's decision, thereby negating any further appeal rights.
